



### Did You know...

Reading for 6 minutes a day reduces stress by 68%?

When children have a home library, as little as 20 books of their own, they achieve 3 more years of schooling than children who don't have any books at home?

Read 20 minutes a day and you'll read 1,800,000 words a year?

Children who read 1,000,000 words a year are in the top 2% of reading achievement?

Children learn 4,000 to 12,000 words/year through reading?

Kids in classrooms without classroom libraries read 50% less than kids in classrooms with libraries?

If a child is read just one book a day, they will have been read 1,825 books by their 5<sup>th</sup> birthday?

## RECOMMENDED PICTURE BOOKS TO SUPPORT THE 6 COMPONENTS OF EARLY LITERACY

### Print Awareness

Noticing print
everywhere, Knowing
how to handle a book
and knowing how to
follow the written word
on the page.

Student sees teachers and others reading, recognizes books and print as a means of communication.

Children know how books work--the front cover, what's upside down, which page to start on, how to look from left to right.

The text connects obviously and directly with the pictures.

Books reflect their lives and interests. Sees teachers, parents and others reading, books are readily available, and reading is a regular activity.


### **Print Motivation**

Being interested in and enjoying books

Kids who enjoy books and reading will be curious about reading and motivated to learn to read for themselves.

Use books that are of high interest, such as books with preschool characters or interactive books. Also, books about books are great for teaching this skill.

- Pete the Cat: I Love My White Shoes by Eric Litwin
- Rhyming Dust Bunnies by Jan Thomas
- Bear Snores On by Karma Wilson
- ► Go Away, Big Green Monster! By Ed Emberley



# Books to build print motivation

A child understands the concept that words are made up of combinations of small sounds.

### Phonological Awareness


Hearing and playing with the smaller sounds of words

Children who can hear how words "come apart" into separate sounds will be more successful at "sounding out" words when they start to read.

Books that promote this are often comprised of silly words and sounds.

### **Books** to teach phonemic awareness

- ► Sheep in a Jeep by Nancy E. Shaw
- Fox in Socks by Dr. Seuss
- Don't be Silly Mrs. Millie by Judy Cox
- ► Many Marvelous Monsters by Ed Heck
- ► The Hungry Thing by Jan Slepion



#### **Narrative Skills**

Help children learn story structure, Predict what will happen in a story, Understand what they read, and build critical thinking skills.

A child understands that in telling stories, that there is a beginning, middle and end.

Let your pre-reader help build the narrative by 'reading' the pictures.

Read books with a repeated pattern or cumulative structure.

- ► The Snowy Day by Ezra Jack Keats
- Wemberly Worried by Kevin Henkes
- Good Dog, Carl by Alexandra Day
- ► Beekle, The Unimaginary Friend by Dan Santat
- Sheila Ray's Peppermint Stick by Kevin Henkes

# Books to support narrative skills

#### **Letter Awareness**

Knowing that letters are different from each other, Knowing letter names and sounds, and recognizing letters everywhere


A child learns the names and sounds of letters.

To read words, children will learn that a word is made up of individual letters.

Pick books that have clear depictions of the letters, both lower case and capital.

### **Books that teach letter awareness**

- ► K is for Kissing a Cool Kangaroo by Giles Andreae
- ► 8-An Animal Alphabet by Elisha Cooper
- ► The Sleepy Little Alphabet by Judy Sierra
- Chicka Chicka Boom Boom by Bill Martin
- ► Alligators All Around by Maurice Sendak



### **Enriched Vocabulary**

Knowing the names of things, understanding the meaning of words, and connecting words to objects, events, emotions, and concepts in the world.


Children who have larger vocabularies have an easier time learning to read and become better readers.


A strong vocabulary helps children with decoding (sounding out) and comprehension (understanding).

Read picture books. They have 3x more rare words than our everyday conversations.

### Wordless Picture Books

## Why should you read wordless picture books?

These books provide an opportunity to ASK QUESTIONS!

- What do you think? (comprehension)
- What makes you say that? (inferring)
- Why do think....? (vocabulary/oral language)
- What do you think will happen? (predicting)

Read and reread these books! Then, have your students "read" the book to you.

Let them know that reading pictures is READING!




### Covid- Supporting our children through books


- ▶ Books are a great way to explain what the virus is, how it spreads, and what children can do to help.


